Cook's Corner

Cindy Broker Crock Pot Cheeseburger Soup

1 lb. ground beef, browned ½ cup chopped onion ½ cup chopped pepper 1 can diced tomatoes (14.5 oz.)

1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. oregano

½ tsp pepper

3 cups beef broth

4 cups diced potatoes

½ cup flour

1 cup milk

8 oz. shredded cheddar cheese

Combine the beef, onion, pepper, spices, tomatoes, broth, and potatoes in crock pot. Cover and cook on low for 8 hours. About 30 minutes before serving, combine flour and milk. Whisk until no lumps remain. Stir into soup. Add cheese and stir again. Cover and cook until soup is thickened, about 30 minutes.

Make Saving Energy Fun

Make saving energy fun! Take the home adventure at touchstoneenergy.com to learn where you can save money. Here's a list to get you started:

Working from home?

- Electronic devices such as cable boxes, printers and TVs use power even when they are turned off, also called a "phantom" load. Use power strips that can be turned off when there are long periods without use.
- Your computer comes with energy-saving features, but they may not be turned on. Activate the power management controls on your computer to save.
- Take advantage of natural light. Set up for the day in a spot with plenty of natural light. Natural light can boost your mood and productivity.

More Energy Saving Ideas

- Do you turn off your TV entirely when not in use? When you are not using the TV, turn it off completely. Many TVs continue to use energy even after they are turned off. Remember to check for energy-saving settings on flat-panel TVs like automatic brightness control and powersaving sleep mode.
- Use lids for your pots and pans to retain more heat and cook food faster plus save energy.



- Enable auto power-down features on gaming consoles to help save energy.
- Limit your shower length to 5-7 minutes to save gallons of water and reduce the amount of energy used to heat it, lowering your water and electric bills each month
- Turn off bathroom and kitchen exhaust fans 15 minutes after the job is complete or install 15 minute timers on bathroom ventilator fans.
- Use cold water when rinsing dishes before putting them into the dishwasher to avoid wasting hot water and energy.
- Run the dishwasher only when it is a full load. Save energy by using your dishwasher's air-dry cycle instead of the heat-dry cycle to dry your dishes.

- Using a refrigerator's anti-sweat heater uses more energy. Use the feature only when necessary. Always switch your refrigerator's power-saver to "on" if available to save energy and money. Clean refrigerator coils at least once annually to ensure your fridge is working properly and efficiently.
- A faucet leaking even just one drop a second can amount to over a thousand gallons of wasted water in a year.



Need Assistance with Your Energy Bills?

In response to the COVID-19 crisis, the Department of Administration has adjusted the eligibility requirements for residents who are seeking heating and electric assistance through the Wisconsin Home Energy Assistance Program (WHEAP). Eligibility will now be based on the household's previous month of income, rather than the former requirement of the previous three months of income. This will allow those who are recently affected by the COVID-19 to receive assistance quickly. Energy Assistance will be open through September 30 for the heating season 2019-2020, with the 2020-2021 season beginning October 1.

*Condensed Board Minutes February 26, 2020

Randy Cook is President of Barron Electric's Board of Directors and represents District 7, which includes the following townships: Stanley, Sumner, Strickland, Stubbs, Rusk, and Big Bend.

- The minutes of the regular board meeting from January 30, 2020 were approved as presented.
- Director Helm gave the treasurer's report, with comments by Manager Sloan. A report of vouchers for the month was presented as part of the board packet as follows: #97302 thru #97426 of CCF Bank was in the amount of \$394,583 and capital credit estate checks in the



amount of \$14,935. Director Helm reported on activity of total receipts in the office - \$2,268,106; total receipts by wire and ACH - \$1,277,619; disbursements by ACH, EFT, wire - \$2,538,407; transfer of funds was made for payroll - \$183,156 and power bill paid 02/26/2020 in the amount of \$2,557,328.

- A membership list of 29 was presented and approved without objection by the board.
- Form 219 summarizing construction activity for the past month in the amount of \$61,855.87 was presented for approval, and included new services \$0; change jobs \$8,385.17; miscellaneous \$53,470.70 and 2 retirements. The Form 219 stood approved as presented.
