

Members Will See a Rate Increase on their March 1 Bill

Barron Electric Cooperative works hard to keep rates stable and affordable. The increasing cost to provide safe, reliable power is being impacted by higher prices for equipment, supplies, interest, and services such as technology, software, engineering, and line upgrades. In the last three years, wholesale power costs have increased 9.5% and have influenced the need for a rate increase. Wholesale power costs account for 67% of a member's bill.

Barron Electric hired Power Systems Engineering to evaluate rates. The study indicated that the cost to provide service, Facilities Charge, is \$41 per month per residential member, whether or not any kilowatt hours are used. Based on this study, Barron Electric's Board of Directors approved a rate increase, effective on the March 1 electric bill. The average residential member using 1,200 kilowatt hours will see a 4.2% annual increase or an average of \$7.25 per month. This rate increase will help to keep the debt-to-equity ratio stable.

"Barron Electric's Board of Directors and staff work hard to keep expenses down while maintaining the goals of reliability and great customer service. We continue to make system improvements using technology for efficiency, reliability, and reducing outages," said Barron Electric's General Manager Aaron Torud. Barron Electric continues to maintain a lean workforce and reduces costs by obtaining multiple bids for materials, equipment and projects and work with vendors with the goal of locking in prices when they are low.

- Nick Nelson, Rate and Financial Consultant from Power System Engineering, Inc. (PSE) presented information to the board regarding the cost of service study and reviewed rates. Question and answer session. A completed rate study is expected to be available by the next meeting.
- A report of vouchers for the month was presented as part of the board packet as follows: #102416 through #102545 from CCF Bank in the amount of \$367,950 and capital credit estate checks in the amount of \$34,880. Total receipts in the office - \$2,666,043; total receipts by wire and ACH - \$3,078,040; disbursements by ACH, EFT, wire - \$4,843,515; transfer of funds was made for payroll -\$216,372 and power bill paid on November 29, 2023, in the amount of \$1,972,689.
- A membership list of 61 was presented and accepted without objection.

GPS Project Will Start This Spring






Clobal Mapping Solutions(GMS) will begin inventory of Barron Electric's system, which will include Global Positioning Systems(GPS) coordinates of all equipment on the system. This project will help improve the outage dispatch process and provide a safer electric system for line crews, contractors, members, and the public. Once completed, this should allow better communication from the cooperative to our membership during outages.

Global Mapping Solutions will start at a small substation, north of New Auburn. Once complete, they will start in the northern part of Barron Electric's service territory and move south. GMS will be on your property to inventory and take pictures of equipment, i.e. meters and transformers. GMS will use ATVs/UTVs and access the Right-of-Way by foot when necessary. Their vehicles will include magnetic signs with Barron Electric's logo, as pictured, and GMS crews will carry identification badges noting they are contracted by Barron Electric. There are no signs on the ATVs/UTVs.

Key Factors that Impact Energy Bills

Fuel Costs & Wholesale Power Electricity is generated at a power plant or from a renewable source before it is delivered to your home. The cost of fuels used to generate electricity fluctuate. In the last three years, wholesale power costs have increased 9.5% and have influenced the need for a rate increase. Wholesale power costs account for 67% of a member's bill.

Facilities Charge

The facilities charge recovers part of Barron Electric's ongoing investments in poles, wire, meters, system maintenance and additional costs necessary to provide electric service. Barron Electric serves 6 members per mile of line totaling \$246 in revenue, while municipals serve 47 consumers per mile of line at \$470 in revenue. Investor-owned utilities serve 35 consumers per mile of line totaling \$525 in revenue.

Weather

When temperatures decrease or increase, heating and cooling equipment must run longer and at maximum capacity, which can impact energy use. Extreme temperatures can also affect electricity market prices. When the need for electricity increases due to extreme cold or heat, the price of power typically rises.

Energy Consumption

The amount of electricity consumed is measured in kilowatt-hours, or kWhs. Members have control over how much energy is used, which helps manage monthly costs. Members can also keep rates stable by reducing demand during high load days or peak alerts.

Materials and Equipment Costs Barron Electric has seen price increases from 60-120% on wire and transformers. Lead time has also increased, which has affected inventory.
